One fun fact: in Germany, due to a trademark held by the Krupp company, the Mustang had to be sold as the Ford T-5 until 1978.

This timeless classic has evolved through multiple generations—but it's still in production today, continuing its global legacy as a symbol of freedom, speed, and style.
