What started as a limited run of 35,000 units in 1968 skyrocketed to nearly 96,000 produced—because people couldn't get enough.

And then came Hollywood.

The Charger starred in *The Dukes of Hazzard* as the bright orange "General Lee," then roared through the *Fast & Furious* films with Vin Diesel behind the wheel of a supercharged black 440 Magnum beast. It faced off with Steve McQueen in *Bullitt* (1968) in one of the most legendary car chases in movie history, ending in an explosion at a San Francisco gas station. And finally? The sinister black 1969 Charger R/T in Quentin Tarantino's *Death Proof*, driven by Kurt Russell, complete with a white skull on the hood.

This car is more than muscle. It's a movie star. A rebel. And a piece of pure American horsepower. And just so you know—it might still bite. 😊
