

Nash Advance Six – 1927 Sedan

A rare survivor from the hills of Pennsylvania.

This elegant 1927 Nash Advance Six comes from Mountain Top, Pennsylvania—a dry, mountainous region where time seems to move a bit slower.

The car narrowly escaped a sad fate: the previous owner bought it from someone planning to turn it into a Hot Rod. Fortunately, that plan never happened. Instead, the car sat untouched in a garage until it surfaced at a local auction—the kind of place where real gems can be found.

Thanks to a live stream of the auction by a progressive gentleman named John Duvall, we spotted the car in time. Our offer delighted the seller, Mr. Joseph Roogers Tito, and opened the path for the car's journey to the museum.

Powered by a 4.6-liter inline-six engine producing 45 horsepower, this Nash was considered well-built for its time. The company enjoyed strong success in the 1920s, although not without a few missteps.

One notable experiment was the Ajax model, intended as a premium version of the regular Nash lineup. It failed to win over customers, so Nash offered conversion kits to visually turn an Ajax back into a Nash Light Six—free of charge.

Despite the Ajax hiccup, demand for Nash cars was so high that production often sold out before assembly even began. This particular vehicle has been proudly residing in the Czech Republic since 2010.
