

Oldsmobile 30-D – 1926 Sedan

One family. One car. One century-old American story.

Our contribution to early American automotive history: the 1926 Oldsmobile 30-D—a car owned by just one family since new. That’s a rarity, and a privilege. When a car becomes part of a family, selling it is never easy. But it happened—and we’re grateful.

Mr. George Wick, a furrier from Albany, New York, decided to part ways with this green beauty after decades of care.

The Oldsmobile Model 30, also known as the Oldsmobile Six, was produced from 1923 to 1927. Each year came with its own suffix: 30-A, 30-B, and so on through to this 30-D, all manufactured in Lansing, Michigan.

The 30-D featured a 2.8-liter inline-six engine producing 44 horsepower—reliable power for the era. Customers could choose from eleven different body styles, available in both open and closed configurations. Prices ranged from \$875 to \$1,075, depending on the trim.

This particular vehicle is in exceptionally preserved condition, fully functional and ready for long-distance touring—we think (fingers crossed)!
